Albertans are growing increasingly concerned about our impact on the natural systems that sustain us. Meanwhile, children and adults alike suffer from Nature Deficit Disorder, spending more time in front of screens and less time outdoors – a disconnect from the natural world that threatens our well-being. Our polling tells us that many youths are discouraged by environmental problems, and lack the skills and motivation to tackle them – and corporate employers point to the workforce’s lack of understanding of sustainable development concepts, emerging clean technologies, etc. To create a sustainable future we need more environmental, energy, and climate education.

ACEE's impact

Since 2005, we've 'moved the needle' when it comes to advancing environmental education:

Increasing students' environmental literacy

- ❖ reached over 10,000 students through Alberta Green Schools, creating a school-wide culture of environmental stewardship and energy literacy
- ❖ connected thousands of preschool children with nature, promoting unstructured outdoor play during our annual Get Outside and Play Week
- ❖ convened over 5,000 teachers in annual environmental education conferences, in partnership with provincial/national organizations, Alberta Teachers Association, and school boards
- ❖ presented well over a hundred sessions at teachers' conventions and conferences
- ❖ supported the learning of hundreds of thousands of students by connecting tens of thousands of teachers to quality environmental learning resources

Harnessing youth voice to guide decision makers

- ❖ engaged Alberta youth to create "How Alberta Schools should show Climate Leadership", a set of recommendations capturing the knowledge and passion of 3,000 students that youth still promote to government leaders

Bringing environmental education into new K-12 curriculum

- ❖ convened a multi-stakeholder Education Task Force to create 'Curriculum for a Sustainable Future,' proposing content for new Alberta K-12 curriculum to increase 700,000 students' environmental, energy, and climate literacy

Building strong networks of collaborative stakeholders

- ❖ helped 75 education teams from schools, NGOs, and municipalities build their capacity and advance their work through a multi-day annual leadership clinic retreat
- ❖ supported many thousands of educators through our monthly newsletter and online resource database for up to date and useful activities and events
- ❖ organized over a hundred workshops and meetings to help agency professionals acquire resources, share ideas, and develop collaborative plans
- ❖ created the Get Outside and Play Network, engaging nearly 800 early childhood professionals in collaborative learning and action
- ❖ conducted robust provincial polling of Albertans' environmental literacy to inform the work of our community, surveying 801 adults and 459 youth

Bringing Environmental Education into the mainstream

The next few years will see new K – 12 curriculum in all core subject areas in Alberta – and we are at the table with Alberta Education and their partners, leveraging almost a decade of engagement and relationship to ensure our proposed [Curriculum for a Sustainable Future](#) is adopted.

Alberta school boards spend more than \$7 billion annually – we work to [galvanize Alberta's Educational Leadership](#) of school board trustees, superintendents, etc., encouraging and supporting them as they 'take the next step' towards environmental sustainability.

We create a [public narrative around the value of environmental education](#), using public events and diverse communication channels (opinion editorials, monthly newsletters, social media) to shine a light on inspiring stories – and encourage others to make their own contributions.

Increasing children's environmental literacy

Through [Alberta Green Schools](#) we partner with school divisions, providing them with learning resources and planning time, helping them create a school-wide culture of energy literacy and environmental stewardship.

Our [Energy Efficiency Education program](#) helps students increase their energy and environmental literacy as they leverage new technology that 'makes energy visible.' Students monitor energy use in real time – then take steps to conserve energy.

[We support teachers](#) by connecting them with quality learning opportunities and teaching materials, working with the teacher professional learning network, bringing in community experts and resources, and enriching teachers' conventions through presentations by our staff and other agencies.

[Appreciation of nature.](#) We agree with David Sobel: "If we want children to flourish and become truly empowered, allow them to love the earth before we ask them to save it." We encourage parents and teachers to take their children outdoors so that preschool and school age children have a chance to receive the gifts that nature provides.

Harnessing youth voice and youth energy

ACEE supports [youth voice to guide decision-makers](#), helping high school students learn about and discuss issues they are passionate about, and then bringing their powerful youth voice to decision makers: Education and Environment Ministers, school board trustees and superintendents, etc.

We also [connect university students](#) to younger students in K-12 schools to inspire them with their passion, give them incentive to pursue their interests in university, and encourage them to take positive environmental action.

Building strong networks of collaborative stakeholders

We [organize conferences and support networks](#) to convene teachers and other stakeholders, in partnership with other associations or school divisions.

We create [capacity building workshops and networks](#) for agencies that deliver environmental education, helping them develop partnerships and find synergies.

We maintain and promote our [online resource center](#), to support collaborative work and provide teachers with quality environmental education materials, presentations, and student learning opportunities.
